

Hugh DURHAM

► 633-429 (37th Season) / 106-119 (8th Season) at JU

Hugh Durham, one of the winningest coaches in college basketball history, has left his mark on yet another basketball program. In eight seasons as the head coach at Jacksonville University, Durham became the Dolphins' all-time winningest Division I coach (106 wins), making him the only coach in NCAA history to be the winningest coach (pct. or wins) at three different Division I schools. He had the longest tenure (8 seasons) of any coach in the 56-year history of Jacksonville University basketball.

He built national programs at Florida State – where he holds the record for best winning percentage with a 230-95 (.708) record in 12 years – and at Georgia – where he is also the all-time winningest coach in the 99-year history of the Bulldog program, having won 297 games in 17 seasons. Durham's career reached new heights in 2003 when he became the 32nd coach all-time to win 600 career games and just the 17th D-I coach to eclipse 1,000 career games. The accomplishments don't end there:

- Durham ranked 8th among active Division I coaches with 633 career wins and is the 25th winningest Division I coach in the history of college basketball.
- He led his teams to 15 postseason appearances.
- Durham earned five conference Coach-of-the-Year awards.
- Durham is the only coach in NCAA history to be the all-time winningest coach at three different Division I schools.
- He is one of just 12 coaches to have led two different teams to the NCAA Final Four (Florida State, 1972 & Georgia, 1983). However, Durham is the only coach to lead BOTH teams to their ONLY Final Four appearance.
- Durham is one of just eight coaches to win 200 games at two Division I schools: Ralph Miller (Oregon St. & Wichita St.); Norm Sloan (Florida & N.C. State); Jim Calhoun (Northeastern & UConn); Lou Henson (New Mexico St. & Illinois); Neil McCarthy (Weber St. & New Mexico St.); Johnny Orr (Michigan & Iowa State); Eddie Sutton (Arkansas, Oklahoma).
- Durham is one of seven coaches with 100-or-more wins at three Division I schools: Tom Davis, Cliff Ellis, Mike Jarvis, Frank McGuire, Jerry Tarkanian and Butch van Breda Kolff.

Durham restored Dolphin Pride at Jacksonville as the Dolphins went from the doormat of the Atlantic Sun Conference to one of top programs in the league. Durham's signature defense and JU's home court dominance at Swisher Gymnasium were the keys to JU's resurgence the last five seasons:

- JU won 78 games over the last five years, which ranks 4th among all A-Sun schools.
- Durham led the Dolphins to 50 conference wins in the last five seasons, which ranks 4th among Atlantic Sun programs (1st among the 7 private universities).
- In the last five years, JU has a 49-19 record at home, which ranks 5th among all Division I schools in Florida.
- JU had at least one player on the Atlantic Sun All-Conference Team in each of its seven seasons in the league, including two-time A-Sun All-Conference selection and 2004 A-Sun Freshman of the Year, Haminn Quaintance.
- The Dolphins have limited opponents to just 69.5 points per game the last five seasons, which ranks 2nd among all A-Sun schools.
- JU has led the Atlantic Sun in blocked shots for 4 consecutive seasons (632), averaging 158.8 rejections per year, while also ranking among the nation's top-25 teams the last four years.
- Since his arrival prior to the 1997-98 season, 18 players who have completed their eligibility at JU have graduated, with three more expected to earn their degrees this year.

Not only does Durham's 44-year coaching career contain just about every award and honor given in college basketball, but he has coached some of the game's best, a "Who's Who" list that includes nine All-Americans, four Academic All-Americans, four first-round NBA draft picks and a pair of Olympians. Fifteen of his former players have gone on to play in the NBA, while he has had 31 players selected in the NBA Draft. His first recruiting class at Florida State in 1966 contained Dave Cowens, who is a member of

JU's Accomplishments Under Durham

- Has posted 78 wins in last 5 seasons, the most in 17 years.
- JU has led the A-Sun in blocks for 5 consecutive seasons (2000-05).
- Led JU to 18-10 record in 2000-01 – its first winning season since 1995-96.
- Led JU to the second-biggest turnaround in school history – a 10-win difference from 1999-2000 to 2000-01.
- Led JU to an 11-7 record and third-place finish in the Atlantic Sun in 2000-01.
- Won 12 games at Swisher Gym in 2000-01 – the most wins ever at Swisher Gymnasium.
- Held opponents to a school-record low 41 percent shooting in 2000-01.
- Held opponents to 63.7 ppg in 2000-01 – second in A-Sun and 30th nationally.
- Opened the 2000-01 season 7-0 – JU's best start since 1979-80.
- Led JU to back-to-back winning seasons for first time since 1995.
- Led JU to seven road wins in 2001-02 – the most since 1973-74.
- Posted a +5.5 rebounding margin in 2001-02 – the largest since 1979-80.
- Started 6-0 at home in 2001-02 – the best start at home since 1973-74.
- Won 12 conference games in 2001-02 – tied for most all-time at JU (1994-95).
- JU led the A-Sun and set a school record by limiting opponents to just 31% shooting from 3-point range in 2001-02.

the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame. He also coached Dominique Wilkins, one of the top-10 scorers in NBA history, as well as former Olympian and NBA standout Vern Fleming, who helped Durham lead Georgia to the 1983 Final Four. In 1972, Durham led Florida State to the NCAA Championship Game, eventually falling to perennial powerhouse UCLA, 81-76.

A native of Louisville, Ky., and a four-sport prep standout at Eastern High School, Durham began his coaching career as an assistant to long-time Florida State coach Bud Kennedy in 1959. This followed an outstanding playing career at Florida State, where his name still decorates the FSU record books in a dozen different categories after scoring 1,381 points during his three-year career. Florida State's annual Team MVP award was re-named the "Hugh Durham Most Valuable Player" award in 1999.

One of a Kind

Head coach **Hugh Durham** is in rare company when it comes to coaches who have led more than one team to the NCAA Final Four. Durham is one of just 11 NCAA Division I coaches to lead two different schools to the NCAA Final Four (FSU, 1972 & Georgia, 1983): **However, Durham is the ONLY coach on the list which led both teams to their ONLY Final Four appearance.**

JU Among League's Best

Head coach **Hugh Durham** restored Jacksonville's pride on the hardwood as the Dolphins went from doormat of the Atlantic Sun to one of the top programs in the league. **The Dolphins have won 78 games in the last five years, which ranks 4th among all A-Sun schools and is the best stretch at JU in 31 years.** The Dolphins won 110 games from 1969-74 under former head coaches Joe Williams, Tom Wasdin and Bob Gotlieb. **JU's 50 conference victories the last five seasons rank 4th among league programs, but 1st among the 7 private schools in the A-Sun, and are the most for a 5-year period at JU in school history.** Off the court, 18 players who have completed their eligibility at JU have graduated, with three more expected to earn their degrees this year.

Durham Wins 100th at JU

Head coach **Hugh Durham** has reached yet another career milestone. **With the Dolphins' 70-58 win at Stetson, Durham became just the 2nd coach in JU basketball history to reach the 100-win plateau and just the 7th Division I coach in NCAA history with 100-or-more wins at three Division I schools.** Durham is also within 3 wins of becoming the Dolphins' all-time winningest coach. Rollie Rourke posted a 107-47 record from 1953-60 when the Dolphins competed as a junior college and NAIA school. **Durham is already JU's all-time winningest Division I coach and the only coach in NCAA history to be the all-time winningest coach at three different Division I schools (pct. or wins).** He already holds the record for best winning percentage at Florida State with a 230-95 (.708) record and is the all-time winningest coach in the 99-year history of the University of Georgia basketball with 297 wins.

Durham Demands Defense

JU has been one of the Atlantic Sun's top defensive teams the last 5 years. **The Dolphins have allowed just 69.5 points per game the last 5 seasons, which ranks second among all A-Sun teams.** JU has also led the league in blocks five consecutive seasons with 794 rejections and has been one of the top teams in the A-Sun defending the three-point shot, limiting opponents to just 32.6 percent shooting from outside the arc. **The Dolphins led the A-Sun in FG percentage defense (.423).**

Block Party - Take Five

One of the reasons JU has been one of the best defensive teams in the Atlantic Sun the past five seasons is blocked shots. **The Dolphins lead the A-Sun in blocks for the 5th consecutive season with 5.6 rejections per game, which also ranks 12th nationally.** JU led the league in 2003-04 with 6.04 rejections per game, which ranked 5th among all Division I schools (UConn, Syracuse, Maryland & Duke). JU's 169 blocks were the most since 1985-86 (170) and rank third on the school's single-season charts. **Haminn Quaintance** led the A-Sun and ranked 9th nationally as a freshman with 3.0 blocks per game and once again leads the team with 2.4 rejections per contest. **JU has blocked 794 shots the last 5 seasons, an average of 5.5 rejections per game.**

Durham Among NCAA's Best

Head coach **Hugh Durham** moved up the charts among college basketball's winningest coaches all-time. **Durham retires ranking 25th among all Division I coaches with 633 career victories after passing Cam Henderson.** He also stands 34th all-time in career wins among coaches in all divisions, passing John Lance.
